

We have just re-signed our lease with the City of Nedlands and Tresillian Arts Centre for another 2 years valid from 1 July 2017.

I would like to mention two of the clauses in our lease:

- Our studio needs to be open for 15 hours per week for public viewing. So please book in to use our press and also allow others to experience the pleasure, and observe the technicalities of printmaking.
- As tenants we are expected to take part in the Tresillian pop-up exhibitions. Each
 member may submit an application to have 2 works entered for each pop up. We will

Studio Notes

STUDIO TIPS AND HELPFUL HINTS

- ➤ Are you aware of the fire exit and location of the first aid kit? The first aid kit is hanging directly under the rollers and brayers rack. In the event of a fire emergency, exit through the main door next to the Tresillian Centre's office. In an emergency or if you are unsure about anything, please ring one of the following PAWA members...Liz Morrison (president):0448 087 082, Rosemary:0403 466 529, or Beth Porter:0406 968 731 (studio co-ordinators)
- ➤ Protect yourself from toxic substances...Protective clothing and good ventilation, are a must. Face masks, safety glasses, and gloves are available for your use...thick work gloves when filing and thin disposable gloves when handling inks.
- > Do not smoke in the print room or eat and drink directly over the working areas.
- > Practice safe use of solvents and wear protective clothing, respirator mask and closed in shoes.
- ➤ Do not use any tools or equipment without having received proper instruction e.g. Setting the roller pressure on both presses.(an orientation of all studio procedures is through the studio co-ordinators)
- > When hiring the press...sign in at the front office and again inside the print studio in the PAWA studio book. Read and observe all the guidelines posted up on the walls of the studio and observe the nominated uses for each area of the studio.
- ➤ When leaving the studio, make sure you are courteous and considerate by leaving the studio and equipment in a clean and tidy way. Bins should be emptied and replaced with a new bin bag, lights, fans and heaters should be turned off and the sliding door and main door locked when you leave. If the paper soaking tubs or kettle were used, these need to be emptied and put away.
- > To borrow a book record the title, your name and the date in the PAWA book inside the bookshelf.

Studio Notes continued

PAPER SOAKING TIMES

Paper must be dampened before intaglio printing so that the softened fibers of the paper, under pressure, can pick up the finest details from the inked plate. The amount of time a paper should be soaked depends on the paper.

The paper soaking times below are approximate: actual times will depend on personal experience and the artist's preference.

We had a great turn out for our June skill share. Special guest James Bryans demonstrated how to replicate the principles of lithography using things you can find around your kitchen.



Kitchen Lithography

This process simplifies the technique of lithography. It is a non-toxic method using things from your kitchen cupboard: aluminium foil, cola (soda) and vegetable oil.

Kitchen Lithography offers everyone the opportunity to experience the technique of lithography at home in their kitchen or in a workshop setting. As with lithography on stone, Kitchen Lithography is a printing technique based on the principle of repulsion between water and grease.

This fast, economical, simple and non-toxic way of doing lithography was created in June 2011 by Émilie Aizier, artist and teacher, Artist pseudonym: Émilion. Step by step instructions are on http://www.nontoxicprint.com/kitchenlitho.htm

Lino Colour Reduction Workshop 9 July 2017

Learn the tools, material and reduction techniques of relief printmaking. When cutting away there are areas left to create colour elements and grooves are carved to create white areas. Learn how to create the images you want and how to register one colour upon another.

James Larkins has extensive experience in the field of design having studied architecture, interior design, printmaking and art. He is currently Treasurer of The Printmakers' Association of WA Inc and has been delivering lino cut workshops for PAWA over the past 2 years. He has also taught printmaking techniques at Trinity School for Seniors for the past 5 years.




Prints by Tony Pankiw, past president of PAWA.

Tony is a professional artist based in Perth. He is now specialising in site-specific sculptures which incorporate historical, cultural, environmental and community factors.

He studied fine art at Curtin (then W.A.I.T) and also completed a post graduate degree from the Victorian College of the Arts. Both these prints are examples of his student work at that time. Etchings on zinc plates, they are from editions of 25 prints, printed on BFK rag paper and incorporate spray aquatint and sugar lift processes.

In 1982, five years after completing these pieces, Tony took out first prize in the Fremantle Print Award and has several awards and acknowledgements of his print making prowess. On the Same Page

A Collaborative Exhibition by Lynne Mitchell and Denise Gillies Bunbury Regional Art Galleries - 17 June to 27 August 2017.

Lynne and Denise share their process of creating collaborative prints for this exhibition

For 'On the Same Page' we produced 12 collaborative pieces as well as 7 individual pieces each over a period of 10 months. We retained printmaking as our primary focus while incorporating a variety of mixed media techniques in our collaborative pieces. Graeme Pages-Oliver (a friend, fellow artist and printmaker) when opening our exhibition commented that not all artists are able to collaborate and he wondered how we had managed it!

We have been friends for several years and we normally work separately in our studios (located in the Ferguson Valley of Southwest WA). We have exhibited together as printmakers at a number of group shows in the past. Along the way we often found many similarities within our respective artworks. This similarity of thought and personality lead us to the concept of collaborating together for a joint exhibition.

We finally made the decision mid last year to approach Bunbury Regional Galleries. The title 'On the Same Page' came first, then the idea that we would work on the same plate and/or prints to produce a few pieces for the collaboration. Our initial plan was to do 2-3 collaborative pieces, with the other works being our individual pieces from our usual art practice. When we took this proposal to the Bunbury Gallery Director, Julian Bowron, he said 'What if it doesn't work?' We were sure we could work together. What we didn't know then was how well and how much fun we'd have!

Once we had booked our exhibition dates, the collaboration process started in earnest. We spent many weeks brainstorming regarding materials, techniques and themes. Our initial ideas included making paper, making books, swapping plates and overprinting each other's collagraph prints. Once we started working on these ideas, some progressed well, some were discarded and other ideas came in their place.



Our first few studio sessions saw us making our own handmade paper. We combined the bucket loads of edge strips we had each torn and collected from our prints during our normal arts practices over the years. These were combined together and mulched to make our paper base. We also each took some discarded prints and print bits, put them through the shredder, or tore them and added these to the paper mash bucket.

We then had several papermaking days in the studio together. We took it in turns to pour our paper mash onto the screens to create various shaped paper sheets. We also each dropped extra bits of our torn up print pieces (in equal portions) randomly onto the newly formed paper to give each sheet a speckle of colour. In this way no matter what else we did to our handmade paper, we both had bits of our individual prints contained within the paper, had contributed equally to its making and were thus both 'On the Same Page'.

For our next few sessions we set about making a series of small collagraph plates. We sat on either side of the worktable and started glueing and collaging 10 small cardboard rounds each to create our collagraph plates. After we were satisfied with our own 10 plates, we swapped and worked on each other's plates to completion.

Once these plates were sealed we had a combined inking up and printing session. We took it in turns to print our plates in a variety of colours. Some prints worked, while others not so well. We used some of these prints as chine colle or collage in our final exhibition pieces while others of the collagraph plates were used to print on the handmade papers for the final pieces.

The next few sessions saw us printing on fabrics, readymade papers and our newly handmade papers using a variety of new and old plates. We spent considerable time side by side over several sessions arranging and overlaying one piece over the other. With each final artwork we produced in the collaboration we were both present at all times in the process. When one printed on paper the other printed the fabric overlay and vice versa. There were many discussions trying out various combinations of each piece until we jointly agreed on our final compositions.

We found we were able to share our ideas freely. There were never any real disagreements, only new ideas and suggestions, which lead to other great compositions.

Gradually over the 10 months of working on this exhibition our anticipated two or three collaborative pieces grew to twelve. There are also more in various stages of completion ready for other projects!

As we both live in a rural area outside of Perth we are more used to working in isolation on our own projects in our own studios. This collaborative experience has allowed us both to rediscover the advantages of sharing ideas and processes along the way and to have a lot of fun while producing a body of exciting artworks for this exhibition. We will be continuing this partnership for some time to come. Watch this space!
